Current Update – April 23, 2021

As of April 23rd, 2021, Canada has a total of 1, 160, 342 confirmed cases of COVID-19. Ontario has 437, 310 cases and Toronto has 138, 007 cases.

Toronto administers over 1 million COVID-19 vaccine doses

As of this morning, 1, 004, 339 COVID-19 vaccine doses have been given in Toronto, making it the first local health region in Canada to administer more than one million doses.

In Toronto, vaccinations are available at city-run immunization clinics for residents aged 60 and older, and residents 50 years of age and older who live in hot spots. Toronto residents aged 40 and older can book vaccinations at participating pharmacies to receive the AstraZeneca vaccine. Residents 18 years of age and older living in hot spots can also get a vaccine at mobile and pop-up clinics in their community.

Earlier this week, Mayor John Tory announced that vaccine doses in 13 Toronto hot spots will be tripled over the next two weeks.

As of Thursday evening, more than 4.2 million doses of vaccine have been administered across Ontario and more than 351,350 people have been fully vaccinated.

Ontario reports more than 4,500 new COVID-19 cases, another 34 deaths

There were 4, 505 new cases confirmed today, up from 3, 683 new cases yesterday. Today is the third-highest daily case count during the pandemic.

Of the 818 COVID-19 patients in Ontario's ICU units, 593 are breathing with the help of a ventilator.

The province's positivity rate is 8.8%. The average number of new cases per day based on the past 7 days is 4, 132, which is down from 4, 292 a week ago today. In the last 24 hours, 34 more people have died due to the virus.

Regarding variants of concern, yesterday health officials have confirmed another 2,700 new cases of the UK variant in the province, as well as another 21 cases of the South African variant and 6 cases of the Brazilian variant.

More than 4.4 million Ontario residents have received at least one shot of a COVID-19 vaccine. At least 355,208 Ontarians have been fully vaccinated against the disease.

Today, the first person in Ontario has been diagnosed with blood clotting linked to the AstraZeneca COVID-19 vaccine. He is a man in his 60s. He received treatment and is recovering at home.

Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health Dr. David Williams reiterated that all COVID-19 vaccines administered in Canada are safe and prevent serious illness, hospitalization, and death related to the deadly disease.

“This case marks the fourth case of [vaccine-induced immune thrombotic thrombocytopenia] VITT out of more than 1.1 million doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine that have been administered in Canada to date,” he said.

The provincial government also announced today that pregnant people in Ontario are now eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. Pregnant individuals will still need to book their shot through the [provincial vaccine booking system](#) or the provincial call centre at 1-888-999-6488, but a letter from a doctor is not required. The government said that the extended dose interval of 16 weeks will still apply to this group.

Wheel-Trans is offering individual rides to City-run mass vaccination sites, pharmacies, doctor's offices and clinics that are giving out vaccines. Customers may be joined by one Support Person on their Wheel-Trans ride.

You may be eligible for Wheel-Trans service if your disability prevents you from using the TTC's conventional transit for all or part of their trip.
